AMANDA HORAN NAMED ARCHDIOCESAN TEACHER OF THE YEAR

The Archdiocese of Indianapolis Office of Catholic Schools named Bishop Chatard Physics and Chemistry teacher Amanda Horan its 2023 Saint Theodora Excellence in Education Award recipient. The award was formally presented to Mrs. Horan by Superintendent of Catholic Schools Dr. Brian Disney at a BCHS all-school Mass on February 2.

The highest archdiocesan honor awarded to Catholic educators; the Saint Theodora Excellence in Education Award is chosen annually from a pool of candidates nominated by archdiocesan school principals. The Archdiocese of Indianapolis comprises 68 schools employing over 2,000 teachers.

"This teacher represents the best in Catholic education and is a model of faith in action, professionalism, and high expectations," Dr. Disney told the BCHS student body. "To be named the top educator in the entire Archdiocese of Indianapolis is an amazing accomplishment."

Principal John Hasty said, "Through her continued commitment to serve our students, families, faculty and staff, Mrs. Horan lives out our mission daily. Her personal commitment to faith, continuous learning, leadership, and service profoundly impacts our students and staff, inside and outside the classroom. We are proud to see her earn this well-deserved and distinguished honor."

TRANSITION TO TEACHING

Mrs. Horan's journey into education began with what she saw as a calling from God, followed by a leap of faith.

Prior to becoming a teacher, Mrs. Horan was a process automation engineer at Eli Lilly. At her home parish of St. Monica, she volunteered as a lector.

A man who had heard her speak at Mass approached her one day and made a simple comment that changed her life. "You must be a teacher with a voice like that," he said.

That exact thought had been tugging at her heart.

"When that man asked if I was a teacher, it felt as though God were speaking directly to me, pointing me toward who I was meant to be," she recalled. "Twelve years into my teaching career, I am more certain than ever that God created me to be a teacher."

The chemical engineering graduate from Purdue University returned to IUPUI to pursue a Master of Science in Secondary Science Education degree. In August 2011, BCHS welcomed Mrs. Horan to its science department.

Today, Mrs. Horan teaches some of the most challenging science courses that Bishop Chatard offers, including AP Chemistry. While her students include some of the 'best and brightest,' she also considers it her mission to find those students who may struggle and help them to see and reach their potential.

"One of the greatest compliments that I receive from students every year is that they did not know that they loved science until they took my class," she said. "When my students found out that I was nominated for this award, they were my biggest champions. Their confidence in me meant the world to me."

In her sixth year of teaching AP Chemistry, Mrs. Horan averages 18 students per class and has an AP exam pass rate of 89 percent.

In a recommendation letter supporting his colleague's nomination for this award, BCHS Physics and Engineering teacher Gary Pritts said that "what really makes Amanda Horan the best candidate for this award is how she inspires her students."

Mr. Pritts used a recent Gospel reading to illustrate his point. The parable talked about how God is like the shepherd who leaves the 99 sheep to seek out the single lost sheep and rejoices upon finding it. "That is how Amanda treats her students," he said.

"She has a special gift for finding sophomores who are taking academic chemistry, inspiring them to see their own gifts, and encouraging them to come back to her as AP Chemistry students their senior year. She loves her high-achieving AP students who score fives on that exam, but she especially rejoices at the student who is taking their first AP science class with her, fights all year to end up with a B, and scores a three on the exam."

Mrs. Horan sees it as her job to believe in the potential of each of her students until each of them can believe in it themselves. She said that she cultivates a classroom that nurtures students while expecting them to give their personal best, creating an environment where young people can grow in their science knowledge and mature as young Christian adults.

"My students may not all continue on to study science or work in a STEM field, but they will all need to be able to interpret data, think critically, treat others with dignity and respect, and collaborate with a variety of people," she said.

Joe Hansen, Assistant Superintendent of Personnel and Policy Support for the Office of Catholic Schools, oversaw the award process for the archdiocese. He explained that nominees for the award were narrowed to several finalists, and Mrs. Horan was chosen as the 2023 award recipient after a panel interview process.

"It was an honor to watch Mrs. Horan in action when I served at Bishop Chatard High School. She was named the Saint Theodora Excellence in Education Award winner because she represents the best in Catholic education and is a model of faith in action, professionalism, and high expectations," Mr. Hansen said. "To be named the top educator in the entire Archdiocese of Indianapolis is a tribute to her dedication and love of students."

Preparing students for the academic rigors of college is a priority for parents when choosing a high school, but it is not the only consideration.

Teenagers excel in an environment where they are prepared mentally, physically, and emotionally for the world they are preparing to enter. Today, as much as ever, it is vital for

young people to be nurtured and encouraged to explore who God is calling them to be.

The Bishop Chatard High School mission literally mandates that we focus a student's day-today experience on the growth of the whole student. That is achieved my immersing students in faith-based experiences.

On September 27, the entire Bishop Chatard student body, led by Father Jonathan Meyer and Father Doug Marcotte, collectively took their adoration

and reverence for the Eucharist to the streets. A Eucharistic procession, which began in the school's main gymnasium and culminated in the school's athletic stadium, gave those in attendance the opportunity to physically journey with Jesus.


"This morning's Eucharistic procession couldn't have been more beautiful, with 800+ students, faculty, staff and parents initially gathering in the main gym to hear Fr. Jonathon Meyer speak of his passion for the Eucharist and Jesus' message of healing, friendship and love," BCHS President Bill Sahm said. "Fr. Meyer spoke of Christ's ministering to the large crowds that would follow Him through the streets and countryside, hoping to get a glance at His face, touch His cloak, or hear Him speak.

"And then, we were able to experience something remarkably similar, pouring out the front doors and onto Crittenden Avenue, following Jesus in the monstrance into the stadium where we knelt to pray for our petitions and thank God for the wonderful gift of His Son."

In planning the Eucharistic procession, Executive Director

of Mission Integration Libbie Steiner explained that school leaders wanted to give students an embodied experience of praying with the Eucharist

"In the same way that Jesus' disciples got up and followed him, the People of God also get up and follow Jesus in the Fucharist." Ms. Steiner said. "When we create opportunities for students to participate in different prayer practices, we honor their capacity for reverence and holiness. Seeina the entire student body kneeling in prayer before the **Blessed Sacrament**



is not an image I will soon forget."

Prior to the procession, Fr. Meyer challenged the students to do more than study Jesus -- really get to know Him.

"The biggest mistake that we can make in a relationship is to presume that you know someone," he said in his talk to students. "Don't put God in a box. Our God is radically, totally available to you 24/7. He is always present through the blessed sacrament." He encouraged students to spend time in prayer and conversation with God.

Following Fr. Meyer's talk, each student was given a card and asked to write the names of three people that they

would like the community to pray for and Jesus to bless. Students were also asked to include on the card what grace or gift they need in their lives, things like healing, strength, love, help in a relationship, people to treat them with dignity, or something else.

Students brought with them on the procession the names of those they asked Jesus to bless along the way. The cards were put in a basket at the end of the ceremony as a visual reminder of the prayers being offered.

Bishop Chatard's annual Living Rosary provides another opportunity for students to participate fully in faith experiences.

Celebrated on October 4 by the Class of 2023, the Living Rosary honors Mary, Queen of Heaven, as the patroness of Bishop Chatard High School. The procession of seniors into the school's main gym forms the rosary as students, parents, faculty and staff pray together the mysteries.

The Living Rosary is the longest-standing tradition at Bishop Chatard. This year was the 58th annual celebration.

A PASSION FOR HELPING OTHERS BRINGS TWO BC ALUMNI TOGETHER

Bishop Chatard High School cultivates connections beyond just the building itself. Those connections and passions for helping others are instilled in students during their four years at BCHS.

It is no different for two Bishop Chatard graduates graduated nearly a decade apart but found themselves working together for the National Hemophilia Foundation, non-profit ล organization "dedicated to finding cures for inheritable blood disorders and addressing and preventing the complications of these disorders through research, education, and advocacy, enabling people and families to thrive."

Maureen Parsons '09 is the Director of Individual Giving at NHF and has been there for about four years. Chloe Fellwock '18 joined NHF as a communications assistant in June of 2022 after graduating from Ball State. Each of these BC alumni had previously worked with non-profit organizations, interest which began at Bishop Chatard.

NHF's core areas are research, education, and advocacy to improve the lives

of people with inherited blood and bleeding disorders. The foundation is made up of 50 chapters across the country. These chapters provide education, support, and a way for people who understand each other's experiences with their bleeding disorder to connect.

Maureen always had a passion for helping others, something that she credits to her Catholic education. Before working for The National Hemophilia Foundation, she worked in non-profit fundraising at the Boys and Girls Club of Indianapolis. "I have been in Catholic education from kindergarten through college," she said. "I think for me, especially at Bishop Chatard, that the

importance of commitment to service is one of the reasons I am in non-profit work."

In her role, Maureen works with major donors and oversees the

planned giving program and some of the donor-led initiatives.

"It's been a really great experience getting to meet the families and hear their stories, especially because it is so rare," she said. "I think that any chronic disorder is hard to navigate especially when thinking about things like insurance coverage and the cost of medicine. Bleeding disorders are so rare and people can

often feel very alone, so it's been very inspiring hearing some of their stories and getting to know the community," she said.

Chloe didn't expect to end up working at a place like NHF, but her time at Bishop Chatard and her internship experiences at Ball State helped her realize her love for helping others.



"I had a lot of great teachers at Chatard that cared so much about what they did. It instilled in me that a.) you should care about what you're doing, and b.) what you're doing is just as important as who you are doing it for."

Working in the communications side of things, Chloe has her hand in just about every part of NHF. "I get to write about campaigns, public advocacy, and it's neat because even though I am not the one doing the research or talking to Congress, what I am doing is making this information accessible to people to keep them updated on what new options there are for them and their families," she said.

NHF hosts a variety of events throughout the year both nationally and individually through its chapters. These include webinars, virtual trainings, and conferences. One of the largest events of the year is the Annual Bleeding Disorders Conference (BDC)





which is three days of educational sessions, workshops, poster presentations, networking opportunities, and exhibits.

"I HAD A LOT OF GREAT TEACHERS AT CHATARD THAT CARED SO MUCH ABOUT WHAT THEY DID. IT INSTILLED IN ME THAT A.) YOU SHOULD CARE ABOUT WHAT YOU'RE DOING, AND B.) WHAT YOU'RE DOING IS JUST AS IMPORTANT AS WHO YOU ARE DOING IT FOR."

Both Maureen and Chloe agree that BDC represents what NHF is all about: Community.

"Because it is such a small tight-knit community, people will meet at the conferences and then come back every year and act like they are best friends that see each other all the time," Maureen said. "It's like a family reunion every year."

"This job gives me continuous opportunities to keep learning," Chloe added, "especially about the people at these conferences, where they get to learn about what the current science and current status of healthcare policy is, all while getting to connect with other people like them. It really brings it home."

SENIUR ADDISON MILLER RECEIVES COVETED EVANS SCHOLAR AWARD

Eighteen seniors throughout Indiana learned in February that they will have their college tuition and housing paid in full as a result of

being named an Evans Scholar. Bishop Chatard senior Addison Miller is in that group.

The Evans Scholarship, valued at over \$125,000 over four years, is awarded annually to high school seniors who have worked as golf caddies during their high school years. Addison, who has caddied at Hillcrest Country Club since she was in the 7th grade, received the scholarship after completing an application and interview process.

"I am beyond grateful for the opportunity that this scholarship has brought me, especially after all the work I put in," Addison said. "It gives me financial stability that I could never take for granted. I'm excited for the options this scholarship is going to give me in college."

While she does not play golf, Addison said that caddying has helped her to develop people and customer service skills that have helped her in other facets of life. "I have had the chance to meet so many amazing people, each of which has taught me something different," she added.

Evans Scholar applicants are evaluated based on a strong caddie record, excellent academics, demonstrated financial need and outstanding character. Scholars are expected to attend either Indiana University or Purdue University.

Addison plans to attend Indiana University – Bloomington in the fall, majoring in forensic psychology with a minor in journalism. According to the Western Golf Association, which supports the Chick Evans Scholarship Program, over 1,100 caddies are currently enrolled at 22 universities across the nation as Evans Scholars.

Sophomores through Seniors are encouraged to attend career speaker sessions. Sessions are held during the students' Seminar period (homeroom) so that they do not miss class.


WHAT CAREERS ARE FEATURED?

WHO WASBISHOP SILAS CHATARD?

Since I've been back at BCHS, I've thought a lot about our namesake – Bishop Silas Francis Marean Chatard. I wanted to know a little more, so I began doing some digging and began a project looking into who Bishop Silas Chatard was. As a starting point, I thought it was important to briefly reintroduce who Bishop Silas Chatard was to our community.

He was born in Baltimore. Maryland, on December 13, 1834, and was the first archbishop of the Archdiocese of Indianapolis. He initially studied as a doctor and felt called to serve the Church and become a priest. He was the rector at the Pontifical North American College in Rome from 1868-1878, only the second rector in that school's history. He then was named the bishop of Vincennes and soon thereafter moved to Indianapolis to become the first archbishop of the newly renamed Diocese of Indianapolis.

During his tenure as archbishop of the Archdiocese of Indianapolis, Bishop Silas Chatard established the building of a grade school in each parish and promulgated attendance at Catholic schools for Catholic children. He raised the status of the clergy establishing 47

new parishes and missions and encouraged the building of hospitals including St. Vincent Hospital in 1881. He also directed the building of our cathedral downtown, SS. Peter and Paul Cathedral.

Sometime after Bishop Silas Chatard finished his tenure, Archbishop Paul Schulte was installed as archbishop of Indianapolis on October 10, 1946. He authorized five new archdiocesan high schools, and Bishop Chatard was among them. It seems clear that Archbishop Schulte had the same

affinity for education that Bishop Silas Chatard did and wanted that displayed with the naming of Bishop Chatard High School.

When I reflect on that I am proud to say that we have continued that same affinity that Bishop Silas Chatard and

Archbishop Paul Schulte had for education. Not only have we strived to maintain that affinity, but we have been highly successful in educating our students. As evidence, BCHS has one of the highest College and Career Readiness scores as determined by the Indiana Dept. of Education. This is not an easy feat, as we are called to educate all students who come to BCHS. We take a wide range of learners from our North Deanery and other grade schools, and they leave our school prepared and ready to tackle the challenges our world presents them.

This is something to be truly proud of. This occurs not only in the classroom, but in our extracurricular activities and faith formation too. With weekly school Mass and many of our students participating in our retreat program, our faith formation takes its rightful place

at the forefront of our mission to educate the whole person. Much like Bishop Silas Chatard, our students, faculty, staff, and community care about their education and their faith!

As I learn more about Bishop Silas Chatard, I think about the lasting impact BCHS had on me while I was a student here. While in my current role I am filled with pride that we are named after him. Bishop Silas Chatard is said to have been "the most scholarly clergyman in America" and we are proud to continue in the scholarly tradition of our namesake.

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


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COLLEGE AND CAREER READINESS




The Indiana Department of Education's College and Career Readiness score measures whether students are prepared for postsecondary life by achieving college or career credentials while still in high school. This includes successful completion of an approved industry certification, successful completion of at least 3 hours of college-level courses, or a passing score on an Advanced Placement or International Baccalaureate exam.

According to IDOE data, Bishop Chatard earned the highest College & Career Readiness score among northside area Catholic schools, and it is among the highest of all public and private schools located in northern Marion and surrounding counties. As demonstrated above, BCHS is well above the state's interim targets for college and career readiness.

GRADUATION PATHWAYS COMPLETION



CLASS OF 2022 GRADUATES WHO EARNED AN ACADEMIC HONORS DIPLOMA



SPRING MUSICAL TEACHES RELEVANT LIFE LESSONS

Some might consider Holly Stults, Miss Holly as she is known to Bishop Chatard theatre kids, an honorary member of the Class of 2023. She took on the role of theatre director in the fall of 2019, just as this year's senior class was beginning their high school journey, and she has kept the curtain rising through some of the most challenging years educators have known.

This spring, Ms. Stults, teacher and Assistant Theatre Director Tristan Zavaleta, and their crew of Trojan thespians are working on the school's spring musical, *Fiddler on the Roof*. Ms. Stults, who also serves as Education Programs Director at Booth Tarkington Civic Theatre, is excited about the educational opportunities that this musical presents from both a performance and cultural perspective.

"Because we are educators first, not entertainers first, we have to think about choosing something that teaches history, ethics, morals, and from our perspective musically, how will students learn to be better musicians," she said. *Fiddler* is set in the mythical town of Anatevka in Ukraine, and the messages about discrimination, antisemitism, and religious freedom mirror issues in the news today.

Ms. Stults invited a cantor from Beth-El Zedeck, a prominent Jewish congregation in Indianapolis, to talk with students about the traditions represented in *Fiddler on the Roof*, the history of the rituals used, and why these are important today.

"To be respectful, I asked for her help to stage," Ms. Stults added, "to be sure that everything is correct."

In songs like 'Sabbath Prayer', for example, the things they do have meaning, she explained. Heads are covered and specific types of clothing are worn for a reason. The necessity of attention to detail and authenticity is important for theatre students to recognize.

Fiddler on the Roof is one of those productions that is both universally entertaining and meaningful. It opened on Broadway in 1964, and since that time it has been performed every single day somewhere around the world, Ms. Stults shared. "Anyone

who has ever felt mistreated – so many cultures – can relate to these feelings."

Each year, Bishop Chatard stages a fall play (drama or comedy) and a spring musical. When choosing a production, considerations include the group of students who will be

auditioning and whether the play or musical is in sync with the values of the school. "Many contemporary shows don't work because of language or inuendo," Ms. Stults explained. "If you would have to change a lot about a production, that says something."

In addition to its potential to teach, *Fiddler* was deemed a good fit because of the student group performing this year.

"Fiddler on the Roof is one of my favorite musicals, and it's great for this group of students," Mr. Zavaleta said. "We have a ton of talented students, and this show has a lot of speaking roles and vocal solos, so we were able to feature many more students in leading and supporting roles.

"We also have an extremely smart group of students this year and this story gives them a chance to dive into some heavier material. They are really treating this story and culture with reverence and respect."

Ms. Stults agreed, explaining that many musicals are girl-heavy, but *Fiddler* has strong roles for both men and women.

"We have a lot of strong male actors this year and knew we needed more than the typical three or four roles for boys," she said. "Collectively, this is a very

mature group of kids who can handle the gravity of this piece, and also then be able to flip for the levity of it too, and not lose control of it."





A THRIVING PROGRAM

In addition to its mainstage productions, Bishop Chatard's theatre program offers classes in Theatre Arts 1 & 2, Theatre Improv, and Technical Theatre and Design. Extracurricular opportunities include the Balding Eagles Improv Team, Thespian Society, and a New Play Festival, which is a showcase of student-written plays.



When staged, *Fiddler on the Roof's* cast, crew and orchestra will likely include more than 20 percent of the BCHS student body. These students will learn much more than how to act or stage a production. Theatre helps students find their voice, think on their feet, build both confidence and humility ... so many life skills, Ms. Stults said.

"It is no secret that businesses and the workforce are looking for creative thinkers, and performing arts opens your mind to finding new ways of thinking and doing things," Ms. Stults said.

As an actor, she explained, nobody gets the role they want every time and things certainly don't always go as planned. "Hearing no doesn't mean no, never. It just means not right now, not this time. You learn how to pick yourself up and move through it."

When the Class of 2023 were freshmen and experienced the COVID shutdown of their spring musical *Guys & Dolls* days before

it was scheduled to open, they experienced this firsthand. That fall, still amid the epidemic, they came together to successfully present *Almost*, *Maine* in a safe and responsible way.

The staging of *Almost, Maine* has been her favorite BC theatre experience thus far, Ms. Stults reflected. Not because it is her favorite play, but "because we did it!"

Mr. Zavaleta added communication, learning to work as a team, and problem solving to the list of life skills that performing arts develop.

"I feel it is so important to experience collaborating on a large project like this because you realize that every person involved is essential and they all come together to make something great!" he added.

Senior Agnes Moriarty, who is playing the role of Chava, the third daughter in *Fiddler*, said that her participation in theatre has taught her a lot about herself.

"Learning improv and performing in live theatre helped me learn how to think on the spot and quickly problem solve. Theatre has also taught me how to keep calm under stressful circumstances since performing in front of hundreds of people in a night is no walk in the park," Agnes said.

"Being able to stay calm helped me stay confident and collected during my interview. I would definitely say that theatre has helped me grow in my self confidence in order to go after what I want to achieve."

JUNIOR BEN LAM HONORED IN PAYBACK CHALLENGE

BCHS Junior Benjamin Lam won a scholarship by completing the Payback Challenge game with Next Gen Personal Finance (NGPF) and writing an essay about his experience. The Payback Challenge game is a simulation that shows students what life in college will be like with a financial focus. After being selected as the representative from Bishop Chatard, Ben was chosen from all the submissions across the nation as an Honorable mention scholarship winner.

To be eligible, each student participating in the NGPF Payback Challenge played PAYBACK, a college simulation game, and then chose between writing an essay or creating a video in response to the following prompt: Now that you've explored a college experience by playing PAYBACK, what did you learn from the game that you'll be able to apply to your future experiences?

Submissions were evaluated based on creativity, clarity, and demonstration of an understanding of key concepts learned from playing PAYBACK. Thousands of students participated and nearly 1,000 teachers nominated the best student essay from their classes.



Following the game, Aiden Duncan was recognized as the 3A Blake Ress IHSAA Mental Attitude Award recipient.


