

Dear Trojans,

The Indiana Legislature, elected by and representing the citizens of this state, proved once again that we understand the importance of school choice for families of K-12 children by passing the expanded school choice legislation during the 2021 legislative session. This new legislation did away with the tiered scholarship amounts (no more 50% and 70% scholarships) and are now all 90% scholarships. Even more impactful are the dramatically expanded income eligibility guidelines as shown in the following chart.

What this means is that the state tax dollars paid by Indiana families will not only support public education, the monies will also be used to help families afford a non-public education. It is estimated that more than 90% of Hoosier families will now qualify for a school choice scholarship. This is truly a blessing for families who can now afford the best quality schools available to them, such as Bishop Chatard.

Each year, our Annual Fund Drive raises money primarily for tuition assistance and teacher compensation. This will continue as most of our families who received the previous school choice scholarship will continue to need additional financial assistance, though there will be a slight savings because some families that did not previously qualify for these state dollars are now eligible. This, however, will not be the case until the 2022-2023 school year for most of our newly qualified families.


Important to note is the fact that the school choice legislation passed in part because of a large increase in public school teacher salaries. The competition for qualified teachers is fierce, in part because of the public school salary increases but also because of a severe teacher shortage. Our need to more justly compensate our teachers is not only an intrinsic good, it is a practical necessity if we are to continue to serve our students, families and the North Deanery community.

Please join with us, this 61st year since our founding, in supporting our teachers and families in need as we continue our tradition of providing the highest quality Catholic education to all who so desire it.

In September of 1961, Bishop Chatard opened her doors and welcomed the first class of Freshmen students. A class of students was added each year to the school, with the first graduating class in the Spring of 1965. We have seen many changes and improvements over the years. Originally, classes were taught almost entirely by priests from the Archdiocese of Indianapolis and the Benedictine sisters of Beech Grove. Our campus had one parking lot, one gymnasium, one convent and one main school building.

Today, our faculty includes some the most qualified educators in Indiana. We enjoy an expanded campus with a second gymnasium and a second parking lot. We recently renovated the St. Benedict Center, originally a convent in the 1960s which now holds a wrestling room with lockers (upper level) and new efficient windows.

Many of the traditions that were built those many years ago are still a part of who we are today. We are still called Trojans, we still have an academic and athletic Hall of Fame, and we still hold the infamous walk-a-thon student fundraiser. More importantly, we still hold to our mission of providing an authentic Catholic education, keeping tuition affordable, and preparing our students for a life-long commitment to faith, learning, leadership, and service.

With the generosity of our wonderful benefactors, we exceeded our fundraising goals this past year, allowing us to keep tuition affordable once again for our 573 families. These funds also allowed us to repair and resurface the back parking lot and replace the 60-year-old windows in the St. Benedict Center.

In this 60th year of Catholic education, full of growth and gratitude, we are mindful of the many gifts we receive from so many:

- Our faculty and staff who believe in the mission and personally care for each of our students
- The many kindnesses poured out from our parish ambassadors, helping families learn more about Bishop Chatard
- Our Trinity Club members who volunteer for every event and program throughout every year
- Our parish pastors who preside at weekly Masses, fundraisers, drama productions, and athletic games in support of their North Deanery students and families
- Our alumni who support us at every turn and entrust their young people to Bishop Chatard to experience an incredible Catholic education experience.



TECHNOLOGY IN A YEAR OF COVID

Many of us are reflecting right now on the year just past: what did we learn, what are we taking into the future. Here are a few thoughts on our technology direction at Bishop Chatard after a year and a half under COVID-19.

Bishop Chatard entered the pandemic with a solid tech platform and faculty and students that knew how to use it. That made a huge difference for everyone in responding quickly to long-term virtual and hybrid learning. No one likes a crisis, but our years of development in digital learning prepared us for the unexpected. Our teachers and students deserve great credit for making the long-term personal commitments that prepared them for a rapid change.

In fact, we did not make many changes to our learning platform and digital tools due to COVID. Canvas and PowerSchool continue to be the core of our platform. We continued to use IXL and other learning tools that we have adopted over the last few years. We added some new collaboration tools such as Classkick and Explain Everything, to give teachers additional options to engage with students in remote instruction. It is difficult to adopt new tools and processes during a crisis, so we intentionally minimized change in this area and chose tools that were very simple to learn.

The most important new tool we introduced to our technology platform was video conferencing. We were not alone in this -- our whole country moved into video conferencing overnight! Bishop Chatard chose to deploy Google Meet as our video conferencing standard, both for its cost (free) and its integration with the rest of our learning platform. Every video conferencing product was under stress in 2020, and Google did a good job of improving Meet quickly to address issues in school usage. We were successful with Meet throughout the year, and plan to continue using it as our standard.

Maintaining student engagement is, of course, very difficult in long-term online instruction. There is no substitute for having students in the classroom, but our young people were able to continue learning from home because of video conferencing. We see this as a new skill that they will take with them into future careers, in a society where video conferencing will be a common practice.

We provided teachers with a few simple options to support video conferencing, including web cams, microphones, and secondary monitors. These add-ons were small, portable, easy to use, and inexpensive. Teachers could choose which options worked best for their teaching style. Many found

that their MacBook camera and audio was the best fit by itself. Mobility is important when moving between home and school to deliver instruction -- this improved the school's flexibility during the pandemic. We piloted more advanced technology in some classrooms but did not find that it was worth the investment. Some schools invested hundreds of thousands of dollars in advanced audio/visual equipment to support remote instruction, but we did not find those tools to improve our learning outcomes.

Our students adapted to video conferencing well, using their iPad and smart phone devices primarily. Some students would use both devices at the same time, running a video conference on their phone while doing work on their iPad. Our Google Meet license allowed students to originate their own video sessions to collaborate with classmates. Our young people are adaptable with technology, and they learned how to apply the tools at their disposal to support their schoolwork. This was not an ideal situation for them, but developing these skills may be one of the silver linings of their COVID experience.


At Bishop Chatard, we always work to ensure that every student has what they need to succeed in academics. Every student receives an iPad, but not every home has sufficient Internet service for remote instruction. Many of our families had multiple students (and sometimes parents) working online at home during lockdowns. We provided assistance to families that could not afford sufficient home internet bandwidth in this situation. We provided referrals to statefunded programs to help families in need. Bishop Chatard also launched a loan program operated out of our tech counter to provide cellular hot spots for students to use at home. This new service was successful in helping these students connect with their classes reliably.

Our world is a different place after COVID-19. As Catholics, we recognize our lives as a journey, and we understand technology as one of God's gifts under our stewardship. Technology emerged as a critical enabler of learning during COVID. Our schools will continue to apply the lessons and tools we have learned during the pandemic in our classrooms. Our young people have developed some unexpected skills that they will carry into their futures. As we are instructed in Psalm 84, we continue to move as a people from "strength to strength." As a school community we learned to adapt, and we made progress in preparing our young people for their futures. Those are big accomplishments in such a difficult year!



ALUMNA'S SACRED ART REFLECTS LIFE AND WORLD VIEWS

Everyone is gifted with a talent. It might be writing, researching, inventing or creating. For Carol (Lyons) Wagner '78, art was a talent that she knew she wanted to get to know better. It wasn't until she looked at the world through the eye of an artist that she felt called to use it for God and for others.

As explained on her website, Carol has created and painted many different subjects over the years, but her recent creations are tied to her faith, the beauty around her and inspiring figures and passages from the Bible.

Carol began taking art lessons as a child and continued to love art through grade school and high school. She even studied art in college at Indiana University. She credits her interest in art beginning in high school, stating "At Chatard, we were allowed to take four years of art and my confidence in my art began to grow."

She continued to nurture her passion for art all while raising four children with her husband and high school sweetheart, Rick Wagner '78. "Being a stay-at-home mom, I began to create pieces to sell, keeping my hand in the artistic side but not so much the creative side," she said.

"When our kids got older, I decided to take some classes at Herron School of Art to revive my passion for art. By then I had discovered that it was a God-given gift because not everybody could do what I did."

An opportunity to share her gifts in a classroom arose when Carol was offered a job teaching art part-time at St. Pius X Catholic School. After spending many years in that teaching position, Carol felt God calling her to a different step in her journey.

The summer after leaving St. Pius X, Carol took part in three mission trips to El Salvador and was able to focus on her artwork more. During that summer, she also received another call that brought her back to her alma mater, working in the Campus Ministry office at Bishop Chatard.

"I really incorporated my creativity in ways that God wanted me to," she said. "I brought a creative side to the role. I felt like I was serving God with both of these roles -- creative side and ministry side."

Leading El Salvador mission trips was a part of Carol's job that she looked forward to each year. The way that she sees it, God gave her these opportunities to share her gift in El Salvador and still be a minister to the faith, helping her to gain even more confidence in her work.

Carol left her position at BCHS to focus solely on her artwork months before the COVID-19 pandemic began. During the pandemic, Carol painted non-stop all day. "I wanted to get into that lane of having my art connect with my life and my faith."

She began creating pieces of art that portrayed religious figures in different races and ethnic backgrounds. "I like

to be globally aware. My experience in El Salvador has made me see the world how I believe that God sees the world; with no walls no borders." She has created several art series. One is entitled "Who is Your Jesus?" and another "Our Lady." Both are filled with depictions of the different versions of various religious figures.

Portraying the Blessed Mother, Jesus and different saints has made this a learning experience for Carol. "I was trying to let God and my awareness of the different things going on around the world guide my art."

Much of her artwork speaks to people in different ways. Instead of thinking of and portraying what society pictures as Jesus Christ, Carol adds a modern and colorful twist making them more likely to catch someone's eye. "I appreciate the classic art but it's always one style in those older pieces. I want to bring life to a piece of art that connects someone to their faith. So, if I put a new spin on it, it's a piece of artwork that attracts people to look at it deeper."

In October of 2020, she hosted an art show in her backyard and invited people in to see her artwork. "It was such an affirming and uplifting weekend," Carol said, "It showed me that this is really the direction that God wants me to go."

Selling and creating artwork for people has been incorporated into every step of Carol's journey. When people want to bring her religious artwork into their homes or sacred spaces, it is impacting their faith in some way.

"The watercolors of homes and portraits that people ask me to do are sacred to them," she said. One customer received a painting of his lake cottage for his 60th birthday from his daughters that was painted by Carol. He reached out to thank her and said that it was his favorite place to be at peace. "That place is sacred to him and the feelings that it brings him are different than sacred art, but all of it is connected to moving someone's heart or mind.



When Carol gained confidence in her artwork, she began to see people connecting with it more. Her notoriety has also led her to meeting people from all walks of life. "My whole journey has been divinely inspired," Carol said.

She wants her pieces to reach different audiences no matter what they believe in. "Just because a piece of art is considered "Catholic," that doesn't mean it's not going to speak to someone of a different faith. If it's a beautiful piece of art and they're drawn to it because of the colors or the way the person in the painting looks, then I love that."

MICHAEL HENRY '02 ACCEPTS JOINT APPOINTMENT WITH TEXAS A&M UNIVERSITY

PNNL data scientist will further collaborations in national security

Michael Henry, a senior data scientist at Pacific Northwest National Laboratory (PNNL), has accepted a joint appointment at the Texas A&M University RELLIS Center for Applied Research and Experiential Learning. Henry will also be the inaugural Director of the Experiential Learning Environment, a component of the newly established Human Machine Ecosystem Laboratory.

"This laboratory is designed to take AI enabled tools and get them into the hands of operators," said Henry. "This will close the research cycle between the development of the capability, assessing its applicability in an operational environment and then using research."

The Texas A&M University RELLIS Center for Applied Research and Experiential Learning provides a collaborative environment for multi-disciplinary, multi-institutional teaching, research, and workforce development instruction committed to blending industry expertise with innovative research.

"I'm really looking forward to being able to take research and put it in the hands of people who can actually use it to solve problems," said Henry. "A lot of people within the national security community will get advanced trainings or degrees at RELLIS. I'm excited to interact with them, learn more about the problems they face, find ways to take research from PNNL and external partners, and get it into their hands to get feedback in this environment."

DR. MICHAEL O'CONNOR '02 NAMED MEDICAL DIRECTOR OF PCD FOUNDATION REGISTRY

Michael O'Connor, MD, assistant professor of Pediatrics at Monroe Carell Jr. Children's Hospital at Vanderbilt, has been named medical director of the Primary Ciliary Dyskinesia (PCD) Foundation Registry, which he also helped develop.

The registry will serve as a repository of clinical data that will include the demographics, symptoms and current therapies of patients with PCD who consent to participate. The hope is that the information will help PCD health care teams develop streamlined care guidelines, drive quality improvement initiatives and enhance PCD treatments and outcomes. Children's Hospital is the lead regulatory site for the registry.

PCD affects the cilia, tiny hair-like structures that line the airways and are important for sweeping mucus up and out of the airway. Cilia are also important in the inner ear, where they help with fluid movement that prevents ear infections, and in reproductive

organs. If the cilia don't work well, bacteria stay in the airways and can cause breathing problems such as frequent cough and recurrent pneumonia. The symptoms of PCD usually start in the first year of life, but the average age of diagnosis is 5 years of age. But for too many individuals, diagnosis comes even later. The disease affects between one in 10,000 and 30,000 births.

Children's Hospital is one of about 40 centers in the United States and Canada to be a fully accredited PCD Foundation Clinic and Research Network site, which seeks to improve awareness and collaboration for the rare inherited disease. Additionally, Children's Hospital is also one of a limited number of centers and one of only two in Tennessee that offer specialized nasal nitric oxide (nNO) testing to diagnose PCD.

"The PCD Registry will make a profound difference in the clinical care of children with PCD as we start to collect longitudinal data from PCD centers across the U.S.," said Paul Moore, MD, director of Pediatric Allergy, Immunology and Pulmonary Medicine, vice chair for Clinical Affairs in the Department of Pediatrics and associate professor of Pediatrics and Pharmacology. "Dr. O'Connor has played a visionary role in the creation of the registry, and he has achieved enormous respect within the PCD research community through his contributions."

In the medical director role, O'Connor, who arrived at Vanderbilt as a resident in 2010, will be responsible for engaging and supporting participating registry sites across the country that are helping to provide insights and guide therapeutic development in PCD. Additionally, he serves as the principal investigator for the registry and lead site manager for Vanderbilt.

"I feel very humbled and honored to be a part of this effort," O'Connor said. "While the registry will be a huge repository of data, it will be more than that, and will serve as a springboard to further research studies. This is a very collaborative effort and is part of a larger effort to build centers of excellence for taking care of individuals with PCD. It has a been a really awesome experience to see what this means to so many families impacted by PCD."

STATE EXPANSION OF CHOICE SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM IS A 'WIN-WIN' FOR BC FAMILIES

Expansion of the Indiana Choice Scholarship Program during the state's 2021 legislative session has opened the door to a Catholic education for many families that previously considered it unattainable.

By increasing the program's household income eligibility guidelines, lawmakers expanded the number of Indiana students who are now eligible for the Indiana Choice Scholarship (commonly referred to as vouchers). Coupled with a higher dollar value now being awarded to each student, the new law is expected to benefit many current and future Catholic school families.

The Income Eligibility Chart on this page shows the maximum income that families of varying sizes can earn to qualify for the state dollars. While there are a few exceptions or potential add backs to this number, the Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) listed on the tax return is the dollar amount used. For example, under the new law a family of five earning up to \$172,272 will qualify for the Indiana Choice Scholarship.

Establishing income eligibility is the first step toward receiving the state financial aid. A second eligibility criteria, known as a track or pathway, must also be established. Non-public schools participating in Indiana's Choice Scholarship program can provide families information to assist them in meeting this requirement.

BCHS President Bill Sahm explained that qualifying students attending Bishop Chatard can receive an Indiana Choice Scholarship anywhere from \$5,200 to \$6,500, depending on the student's township residence. Under the 2021 law, Choice Scholarship awards amount to: tuition and fees charged at the eligible school or 90 percent of the per-student state funding for the student's school corporation of residence. Multiple students in the same family may receive the scholarship.

"It is your tax dollars coming back to you to help pay for a Bishop Chatard education. It is a win-win for all involved," said BCHS Business Director Dan Thompson. Students who qualify for a Choice Scholarship will also qualify for a minimum \$500 Tax Credit Scholarship.

In addition to helping more parents make a Catholic education for their children a reality, passage of the new law will allow Bishop Chatard to use funds previously allocated for tuition assistance for other purposes.

Indiana has operated as a school choice state since 2011. According to the Indiana Non-Public Education Association, about 273,000 children have benefited from the program by being able to attend the non-public school of their choice.

"Making the Bishop Chatard educational experience more affordable is truly a blessing for all of us who believe that Bishop Chatard is the best high school option available," President Sahm said.

Bishop Chatard High School had the honor of serving as the host site for the Indianapolis Fire Department Emerald Society 9/11 Memorial Mass on September 10. Firefighters and other first responders from throughout the Indianapolis Metropolitan area attended the annual Blue Mass to honor those killed in the line of duty.

Dignitaries in attendance included Indianapolis Mayor Joe Hogsett, IFD Chief Ernest Malone and IFD Battalion Chief Howard Stahl. The Mass was officiated by Fr. John McCaslin, IFD chaplain and pastor at St. Monica Parish in Indianapolis. The presentation of colors by an IFD Honor Guard and a bagpipe rendition of 'Amazing Graze', along with a giant American flag flown between two firetruck ladders at the school entrance, added to the solemnity of the Mass.

Battalion Chief Stahl addressed those in attendance, including over 500 BCHS students who were not yet born in 2001, telling the story of one group of firefighters who were in the World Trade Center's North Tower immediately after the South Tower collapsed.

"Command ordered all Companies to evacuate the North Tower. This time the radios worked, and Command ordered Ladder 3 to evacuate. Captain Patrick Brown of Ladder 3 replied, 'Negative, Ladder 3 refuses the order. We have too many injured civilians and we won't leave them. We're on 35, this is Truck 3 and we're still heading up.'

"That was his final transmission," Stahl said. "Soon the North Tower would collapse and everyone remaining would be lost. We pray today that Paddy Brown, his crew, and all the souls kept heading up all the way to God's arms. We remember with a simple phrase, 'Never Forget."

During his homily, Fr. McCaslin told the students about the firefighters killed on Sept. 11, 2001, "They were selfless, they served others, so can you."

Following the Mass, a plaque was presented to Bishop Chatard school leaders commemorating Warren "J.C." Smith, a 1990 graduate and firefighter who was killed in the line of duty in 2000. The plaque was accepted by BCHS President Bill Sahm, Principal Joe Hansen, and Warren's brother, Marcus Smith, a 1993 graduate. The Emerald Society also presented its annual \$1,000 scholarship, given to the son or daughter of a first responder, to Bishop Chatard freshman Camdyn Hardaway.

The MYLC was established by Indianapolis Mayor Joe Hogsett in 2018 with support from MCCOY, Leadership Indianapolis and the Lilly Endowment. The 2021-2022 group was announced in July 2021.

Bishop Chatard Trobotics students competed on May 20 in the VEX Robotics World Championship. This was the first time in school history that a BC team qualified for the world competition.

The 2021 Live Remote VEX Robotics World Championship included over 225 teams from around the world competing in a live remote tournament format. Over two days, the team of Sam Bush '22 and Renee Jessee '21, now a freshman at Purdue University, competed in seven qualifying matches with four wins, two losses and one tie. The team advanced to the final tournament and finished in the tournament quarterfinals.

Team mentor and moderator Gary Pritts, a Physics and Principles of Engineering teacher at Bishop Chatard, explained that Sam and Renee's team was chosen to compete in the world competition based on their season performance.

Due to the pandemic, the team had to modify its practice schedule which meant including a number of Saturday practices. But the experience and work ethic that the students brought to the competition was evident. New developments by Renee in the automation and control of the robots paid off in competition.

The lessons learned at Bishop Chatard are translating into college and career success.

"We have an incredible science department that knows how to connect with kids and inspire them to learn beyond just their science classes in high school," Mr. Pritts said. "The best feedback I get on this usually comes from anecdotal conversations with parents who tell me their children are thriving in STEM fields in college and felt well prepared by their high school classes."
